A Message from the President

Students do not have to be a member of the Lambda Beta Society to apply for any of these scholarships. We currently offer four (4) scholarships/awards. Each has a different set of criteria and dollar amounts. Below is a link to the application and a brief explanation of each of these awards. H. Frederick Helmholz, MD Scholarship - Up to \$2,500

This scholarship is presented on the merit of an independent, original narrative review of literature related to the practice of respiratory care and must comply with the application requirements and deadline.

CoARC Stephen P. Mikles, EdD, RRT, FAARC Media Award - Up to \$2,000

This award is sponsored by CoARC and is presented on the merits of an original presentation of electronic slides in PowerPoint or another presentation format, video presentation, or other presentation relevant to respiratory care and must comply with the application requirements and deadline.

NBRC Leadership Award - Up to \$2,000

This award will be presented to a student who has shown exemplary leadership in their educational career as well as volunteer and community service.

Brad Leidich Memorial Scholarship - Up to \$1,500

This award will be presented to a first-generation student enrolled in an associate degree program in respiratory therapy, who has shown exemplary academic performance, and has demonstrated a commitment to his/her career goals, and scholarly and community activities in respiratory care.

Chapter Feature: University of Michigan - Flint

BSRT Program

The UM-Flint Bachelor of Science in Respiratory Therapy (BSRT) program is a degree advancement program designed for individuals who have graduated from a CoARC-accredited respiratory therapy program with an associate's degree. This

unique curriculum is entirely online and designed to provide a natural transition from an associate degree to a baccalaureate degree and reflects the commitment of the respiratory therapy profession to increase entry-level standards to the baccalaureate level. The BSRT Program at the UM-Flint allows therapists the opportunity to study advanced respiratory care in specialty areas, such as critical care, disease management and diagnostics. Additionally, graduates can gain employment as advanced clinicians, administrators and educators. The program helps prepare students to sit for the Neonatal Pediatric Specialty (NPS), Adult Critical Care Specialty (ACCS), Registered Pulmonary Function Technologist Specialty (RPFT), and Sleep Disorders Specialty (SDS) credentials, all awarded by the National Board for Respiratory Care (NBRC). The 30-credit hour program includes didactic coursework (online) and a capstone project that can be completed in one year. Admission into the program is on a rolling basis, and students can start the program during fall, winter, or spring semesters.

Faculty

Nicholas A. Prush, PhD, MHA, RRT, RRT-ACCS, is the founding Program Director and Clinical Assistant Professor for the UM-Flint Bachelor of Science in Respiratory Therapy (BSRT) degree advancement program. Nicholas received his respiratory therapy training from Henry Ford Community College, where he graduated with an AAS in 2003. He obtained his Bachelor of Applied Science (BAS) from Siena

Heights University in 2008 and a Master of Health Administration (MHA) from Eastern Michigan University in 2014. He obtained his PhD in Healthcare Administration from Walden University in 2020. Nicholas began teaching at Oakland Community College with their respiratory therapy program as an Adjunct Professor. Most recently, he taught at Monroe County Community College for seven years, four years as the Director of Clinical Education, and three years as the Program Director. Nicholas is an active member of the Michigan Society for Respiratory Care (MSRC), serving as the AARC Delegate, the MSRC Conference Co-Chair, and the Sputum Bowl Committee Chair. His research interests include Interprofessional Education (IPE) and COPD readmission penalty reduction.

Shane J. Spaulding, MHPE, RRT, is a Leo Lecturer for the UM-Flint Bachelor of Science in Respiratory Therapy (BSRT) degree advancement program. He received respiratory therapy training at Monroe County Community College in Southeastern Michigan. Shane obtained his BA from the College of William and Mary and earned his MHPE (Health Professions Education) from Michigan State University. Before joining the UM-Flint, he taught for seven years at the Monroe County Community College, three of them as the DCE for the program. Shane brings a student-centered, community-engaged approach to his educational philosophy.

Student Admission Requirements

The UM-Flint BSRT Program is seeking students who meet the minimum requirements for admission. The following is necessary for acceptance into our program:

- Associate degree from a CoARC-accredited respiratory therapy program.
- Certified Respiratory Therapist (CRT) credential with the ability to matriculate to the Registered Respiratory Therapist (RRT) credential by the Capstone course awarded by the National Board for Respiratory Care (NBRC).



Where Are They Now?

Winner Spotlight Q&A With Jennifer Thompson, RRT

Jennifer Thompson graduated from Kalamazoo Valley Community College in April 2020. Following graduation, she quickly began her respiratory therapy career during the global COVID-19 pandemic working for three wonderful hospitals: Bronson Methodist Hospital, Ascension Borgess Hospital, and University of Michigan Health-West, as an adult critical care respiratory therapist. Currently, Jennifer works as a respiratory therapist for Advent Home Medical. She spends quality time with mechanically ventilated patients in their homes or at local clinics providing comfort and ease of breathing to ALS & neuromuscular disease populations.



Why did you choose a respiratory therapy education/educational program?

I chose to join the respiratory therapy field because I enjoy helping others, and I knew this career choice was my calling. Respiratory therapy truly is an art, where we can use our multiple patient care skills and vast cardiopulmonary knowledge to assist a variety of patients to breathe easier.

What piece of advice would you give to current respiratory therapy students?

Remember to always take a moment when you start to feel overwhelmed and just breathe, you've got this! While you're currently in a challenging educational program and joining a demanding career field, it's very rewarding.

What was most memorable to you about your experiences in a respiratory therapy education program?

All the laughter and learning I shared with my classmates. There was a lot of blood, sweat and tears throughout our educational journey together, but the most memorable part was the bond created between all of us. On day one of the respiratory therapy program, we walked in as strangers, and 730 days (two years) later we walked out as a family. My classmates and I were confidently and competently ready to spread our wings and embrace the COVID-19 pandemic together.

How has your education impacted your professional life?

My respiratory therapy education has helped me to become a valuable member of the patient care team. My career choice allows me to help patients recover from their ailments or die with dignity.

What is the most valuable information you learned while you were in respiratory therapy school?

My education taught me to just breathe. When work gets busy and overwhelming, which it always does, respiratory therapists must be the ones who stay cool, calm and collected. RTs are like ducks peacefully floating on chaotic waters — from the surface it appears the ducks are relaxed and unaffected by the current, but beneath the surface little webbed feet are frantically paddling to maintain composure. RTs must be the ones who help sustain a calm atmosphere in the healthcare setting.

What do you enjoy the most about the respiratory therapy field?

I enjoy respiratory therapists' teamwork. While our profession is relatively small, we are an extremely necessary allied health field. One of my favorite quotes says, "Save 1 life — you're a hero, save 100 lives- you're a nurse, save 100 nurses- you're a respiratory therapist."

Where has your job taken you? Describe your career path.

Following graduation, my job began in adult critical care. I became a comprehensive respiratory therapist working for three hospitals at the same time. I am so grateful for the knowledge and skills I gained from those experiences. The challenges I faced and lessons I learned during the global respiratory pandemic (COVID-19), led me to at-home mechanical ventilation. I now provide specialized care for pediatric through geriatric patients suffering with all respiratory ailments requiring NIV or trach care via a ventilator.

How did you hear about the Lambda Beta Society? In your opinion, what are the benefits of a Lambda Beta Society membership?

I learned about the Lambda Beta Society through my respiratory therapy educational program. It is beneficial for RTs to become members of the LB society because it's important for all of us to support our profession, as well as future learners joining us in this amazing, allied health field. 
