Where Are They Now?

Winner Spotlight Q&A

Why did you choose a respiratory therapy education/educational program?

My experience with taking care of my mother, who suffered terminal breast cancer and her death, made me want to help people, but I was unsure how. Then, my counselor introduced me to the respiratory care profession. The respiratory care profession does not exist in my home country, so I became very curious about what made it unique. When I took the introduction class for respiratory care taught by my very first mentor, Louis Sinopoli, EdD, RRT, AE-C, FAARC, I was captivated and knew this was the path I wanted to pursue.

What piece of advice would you give to current respiratory therapy students?

Knowledge is power. Never stop learning. However, don't feel overwhelmed by the volume of information. You don't need to know everything. Instead, you just need to know where to find the information when you need it, as Albert Einstein once said.



Yoko Tanaka, BSRT, RRT-NPS

Yoko Tanaka is a registered respiratory therapist currently serving as the Cardiopulmonary Manager at Cedars-Sinai Marina Del Rey Hospital. Her leadership philosophy is "It's not about being the best. It's about making others better." She has been affiliated with the American Association for Respiratory Care and the California Society for Respiratory Care from her early days as a respiratory care student. She obtained an Associate of Science in Respiratory Care from El Camino College, followed by a Bachelor of Science in the same field from Boise State University. She graduated during the chaotic COVID-19 pandemic with cum laude honors. Her original narrative review of literature related to respiratory care practice earned her the *2021 Frederic Helmholz, MD Scholarship* from the Lambda Beta Society.

What was most memorable to you about your experiences in a respiratory therapy education program?

I had the opportunity to care for a patient suffering from Pulmonary Alveolar Proteinosis (PAP). PAP is a rare disease where a specific protein accumulates in the alveoli, complicating breathing. I closely monitored her, from her pre-Pulmonary Function Test (PFT) before the Whole Lung Lavage (WLL) procedure to her post-PFT. Witnessing a patient transition from her most vulnerable state to being able to leave the hospital with a smile, saying, "I can take a deep breath!", was a truly enlightening experience for me.





How has your education impacted your professional life?

My education gave me the “shoes” to take that next step. My educational journey has shaped me into a well-rounded professional and led to a management career I never envisioned for myself.

What is the most valuable information you learned while you were in respiratory therapy school?

Things won't always go as planned. You won't always get the outcome you want. That doesn't mean you failed. It means there's something better in store for you. Just keep going.

What do you enjoy the most about the respiratory therapy field?

I fell in love with the aspects of applying science, mathematics, physics, human anatomy, and technology to my work while also helping people. I'm blessed to have the opportunity to care for patients who share their precious lives with me.

Describe why & how respiratory therapists are so vital to patient care.

I have learned that sharing our expertise and knowledge through collaboration has brought our profession closer to others and reminded us how we play an essential role in delivering quality care to patients. I am very grateful to be part of the interdisciplinary team that helps patients.

In your opinion, why is it important for allied health disciplines, such as respiratory therapy, to have national honor societies?

For our profession to flourish within the existing healthcare system, it requires recognition and credibility. This showcases a well-educated, dependable, and professional background. In my opinion, having a national honor society like the Lambda Beta Society significantly contributes to enhancing respect, increasing awareness, and improving the quality of patient care.

How did you hear about the Lambda Beta Society? In your opinion, what are the benefits of a Lambda Beta Society membership?

I discovered the Lambda Beta Society through Boise State University. My professor suggested that I submit my final project and apply for a scholarship. Receiving a scholarship award from the national honor society boosted my confidence.
